Since our last newsletter, we have graduated 500 new alumni and expect great things from them.

The district has been recognized with a Lighthouse Award by the state Department of Education for advancing educational equity through our articulation agreements allowing our students to receive college credit while in high school.

Our two academies have once again been placed among the top four public high schools in the state by U.S. News & World Report.

Our students excelled in extracurricular competitions and other activities over the summer, including the thrilling win by Sargam Mondal of Edison Academy in the national Math League competition, the first female winner ever; Woodbridge Academy's HOSA team, which won numerous awards at the International Leadership Conference in Dallas; and SkillsUSA state golds and a national silver for Mike Rizzi of East Brunswick Magnet School.

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

RWJBARNABAS HEALTH WORKFORCE PARTNERSHIP

Strategic partnership to create healthcare career pathways for students at Middlesex County Magnet Schools and Middlesex College

As part of Middlesex County's \$25 million investment in the Jack & Sheryl Morris Cancer Center — New Jersey's first freestanding cancer hospital scheduled for completion in late 2024 — Middlesex County and RWJBarnabas Health unveiled the RWJBarnabas Health Workforce Partnership. This partnership aims to create unique educational pathways and curricula for the benefit of Middlesex College and Middlesex County Magnet School students, as well as meet the future workforce needs of the Jack & Sheryl Morris Cancer Center at Rutgers Cancer Institute of New Jersey and RWJBarnabas Health.

Highlights of the RWJBarnabas Health Workforce Partnership include: three educational tracks including one new one, Sterile Processing Technician, and updates to two existing curricula − Patient Care Technician and Certified Medical Assistant at Middlesex College and the Magnet Schools Internships and volunteer opportunities for College and Magnet School students throughout the RWJBarnabas Health system, job placement for College and Magnet School students who obtain a degree or certification, and additional resources for workforce development via incumbent worker training and SkillUp™ Middlesex Learning Platform to support upskilling existing RWJBarnabas Health employees.

Sharing the significance of this partnership, speakers included Middlesex County Commissioner Director Ronald G. Rios; Mark Manigan, President and Chief Executive Officer, RWJBarnabas Health; Dr. Steven K. Libutti, MD, FACS, Director of Rutgers Cancer Institute of New Jersey and Senior Vice President, Oncology Services, RWJBarnabas Health; Middlesex County Commissioner Chanelle Scott McCullum; Middlesex College President Mark McCormick; Middlesex County Magnet Schools Superintendent Jorge E. Diaz; and Middlesex County Administrator John A. Pulomena.

"When we talk about economic development, workforce development is the bedrock," said Middlesex County Magnets Schools Superintendent Jorge E.




SUPERINTENDENT SPOTLIGHT

NEW BEGINNINGS

Five hundred students graduated from the Middlesex County Magnet Schools June 22 and 23.

There were 169 graduates of East Brunswick Magnet School in a ceremony held in the school gymnasium. The valedictorian was Prisha Shah of Sayreville, while the salutatorian was Semantha Ngo of Woodbridge. Edison Academy Magnet School graduated 43 seniors in a ceremony in West Hall of Middlesex College. The valedictorian was Adrija Kundu of Edison, and the salutatorian was Sharafa Mohammed of Edison. At Perth Amboy Magnet School, there were 67 graduates in a ceremony in the school cafeteria. Griffin Kennedy of Iselin was valedictorian, while Danissa Marte of Perth Amboy was salutatorian. There were 148 graduates of Piscataway Magnet School in a ceremony in the gym. The valedictorian was Bayane Chahine of Highland Park, and the salutatorian was Raniya Burkett of Perth Amboy. At Woodbridge Academy Magnet School, 73 seniors received their diplomas in the school gymnasium. Jasmine Wilk of Middlesex Borough was valedictorian, while Shrihith Golugula of Monroe was salutatorian.

FACILITIES NEWS

Check out the various projects and accomplishments the Facilities department has diligently worked on to keep our District up-to-date and looking great!

Summer Work Program: The facilities department was very excited to implement their Summer Work Study Program for the students of our district. Students worked five hours a day, Monday through Friday across multiple campuses in our district. Our grounds crew capped off this very successful venture with the installation of the new trees and plants in the front of the board offices with our students from the three campuses from the Summer Work Study Program.

East Brunswick Magnet School: The renovations of the auditorium are coming along with new ceilings, new carpets and chairs to follow soon. Three main hot water heaters were also replaced at this campus, along with roof replacements to the District's central office.

Peth Amboy Magnet School: A number of rooftop units have been replaced, with the most recent being the college side and the main office area. New carpets were added in the media center, main office suite and computer labs. New security fencing with an automated section has been installed.

Piscataway Magnet School: A full renovation of two science labs were completed. Roof replacements to the main office area were done. All of the interior walls have been given fresh, new paint. Currently in progress is the replacement of three main hot water heaters.

Woodbridge Academy Magnet School: New fencing was added to the transformers area.





The Woodbridge Academy Magnet School excelled at the HOSA/Future Health Professionals International Leadership Conference in Dallas over four days in June.

"These students put in several sleepless nights and days to make it through the Southern Regionals and State Leadership Conference to make it to ILC," advisor Rafael Nava said. "We are proud of each and every one of them as they have admirably not only represented Woodbridge Academy but also the entire state of New Jersey."

Edison Academy Magnet School Student is First Female to Win National Math Competition

Sargam Mondal, a junior at Middlesex County's Edison Academy Magnet School, made history in a national high school math competition, coming in first among more than 1,600 competitors. No female had won the championship in the 40-plus years of the American Regions Mathematics League's competition. Sargam, an Edison resident, had finished second in 2022 while a freshman.



Her principal, Amro Mosaad, likened the win to becoming the first woman to be elected president of the United States. "This is the most prestigious high school math competition there is," he said. "It's a national competition competing in four regions on the same day – they compile all the scores and she was first in all the regions." Sargam's victory, held at Penn State University in June, came while she was still a sophomore, so she will have a chance to "three-peat."

"I'm very proud to say we have a trailblazer," said Mosaad, who is director of Sargam's Central Jersey Math League team, which finished in the Top 10 in the national competition. "We hope that her achievement is going to encourage more girls to participate in mathematics and in STEM in general," Mosaad said.

Sargam is doing what she can to encourage female students, starting the Lovelace Math Circle for middle-schoolers. The online group is named for Ada Lovelace, a 19th-century mathematician and writer – and daughter of Lord Byron – who did pioneering work on what would many years later become computers.

She says it wasn't until eighth grade that she became interested in math competitions. It is the fact that intuition and creativity are needed to solve the problems that appeals to her, she said. "I think we will be hearing a lot more from Sargam in the future. We are so very proud of her," said Middlesex County Magnet Schools Superintendent Jorge E. Diaz. "This is also a testament to the rigorous programming we maintain at the nationally ranked Edison Academy Magnet School."

Summer Enrichment Program Offers 'Learning for Learning's Sake'

Fifty Middlesex County Magnet School students attended a free summer enrichment program that offered a dozen options to enhance their learning.

The federally funded program, in its third year, was held over three weeks in July and August at Woodbridge Academy Magnet School.

"It's not summer school," said program coordinator Anthony Crea, a science teacher at East Brunswick Magnet School. "The kids were there to learn for learning's sake.

"And it helps with a lot of the COVID learning losses," he added.

The students came from all five Middlesex County Magnet Schools.

Crea said popular courses included how to write essays for college applications, taught by Woodbridge Academy English teacher Leah Hoffman; interviewing skills and resume building, taught by East Brunswick Magnet School teacher Thomas Leibering; and exercise science and nutrition, taught by Tiahna Selby of Piscataway Magnet School.

The classes were held from 9 a.m. to noon Monday to Thursday. Each course lasts four days. "It was well received by the students," Crea said. "They arrived eager and left smiling. There's no pressure – there's no exam at the end."



Eighth-Graders Get an Inside Look at the Middlesex County Magnet Schools

Rising eighth-graders from across Middlesex County were introduced to the Middlesex County Magnet Schools in July at the district's first Early Career Exploration Institute.

An average of 70 students attended each day of the free three-week program, which offered them a chance to experience a number of Magnet Schools career majors, including automotive collision and technology, culinary arts, building trades, welding, digital media, finance, dance, digital film, architecture technology, and music performance and technology.



The classes were held Monday to Thursday at East Brunswick Magnet School, and the program included field trips and demonstrations, such as a visit by Elijah's Promise, World Bank, and two members of the Middlesex County Sheriff's Department K-9 corps.

Parents were invited on the final day for a gallery walk where their students demonstrated the culmination of their learning. Deborah DeVico of Sayreville, whose son Devin attended, was enthusiastic about the opportunity. "He came home every day loving it," she said. "He wants to go to school here." "It was really fun and it taught me a lot," Devin said.

Lee Neamand, Magnet Schools Director of Career and Technical Education, said the first year of the institute was "incredibly successful." "It gave the students an opportunity to engage in our career majors," she said. "It was powerful for parents to have an opportunity to ask questions about careers

majors while their students were demonstrating learning." "This is decision time

for them," she added. "We want parents to understand what vocational education that is College Ready, Career Ready and Life Ready looks like."

She stressed that rigorous career education is accompanied by college-prep academic classes throughout the high school years.



Magnet Schools Coordinator Raises Money to Equip Police Dogs

A report of a police dog killed in the line of duty inspired an employee of the Middlesex County Magnet Schools to launch a foundation to fund safety equipment for K9 officers.

James Wiater, a cooperative education coordinator based at Piscataway

Magnet School, started the Friends of Solo Foundation to honor K9 Solo, a German shepherd in the Monmouth County Sheriff's Department shot to death during a 22-hour police standoff with an armed man.



"The first vest was delivered in March of 2017," Wiater said. "And right now we're ready to order number 23." The vests can cost as much as \$3,400. Police departments that request them are placed on a waiting list and served on a first-come basis, he said. The vests are designed to stop bullets from handguns.

The foundation, a registered nonprofit, has a number of corporate, business and individual sponsors and is supported by dozens of PBA and FOP chapters around New Jersey. Recently, K9 Bolt of the Point Pleasant police received a field trauma kit, K9 Mako of the Ocean County Sheriff's Department received a ballistic vest, and K9 Harley of the Phillipsburg police will soon receive a vest. Equipment has been donated to departments in Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Tennessee.

"We've really gone across the country," Wiater said. "We've got a good number of sponsors." Wiater, a 1981 graduate of East Brunswick Magnet School, had his own carpentry business before becoming a carpentry teacher for 23 years at Piscataway Magnet School. He began his new job, in which he places students in part-time jobs in their career majors, in September. "It was Solo's

sacrifice that made this happen and has now helped other dogs," he said.

development, workforce, education, arts and culture, and transportation. Existing


businesses and new prospects should take advantage of these incredible resources to build or grow their footprint in our County."

From Stress to Success: Creating a Supportive Classroom Environment

Teachers feel overwhelmed and pressured to cover all of the standards and materials to reach benchmarks. But students who are experiencing emotional or psychological distress, mild or otherwise, are unable to engage in learning effectively, despite your efforts.



Taking time out of instruction to help students regulate can seem counterintuitive, but it's actually quite the opposite. One of the most impactful practices teachers can employ is creating an environment conducive to genuine learning.

As the old saying goes: An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. Below are some strategies to help build resilience and connection in your classroom.

Learn their names. This sounds very basic, but according to polyvagal theory, when we hear our name, our brains light up in the areas that support connection and regulation. This could help students (and teachers) feel connected and supported.

Smile. When you smile, it releases endorphins, the brain chemicals associated with happiness. When you smile and make eye contact with someone, it is difficult for them not to smile back, thus creating endorphins for them, too.

Model emotional regulation. Everyone has bad days, and it's important for young people to know this is normal. When you are having a difficult day, acknowledge it and explain to students how you are going to deal with it. For example: "I woke up late and didn't have time for my regular routine this morning. I'm feeling not quite ready to jump in, and I'm sure some of you are right there

with me. Let's take a 'mindfulness moment' and get ourselves ready to go."

Our school district is dedicated to enhancing the educational experience for our students through various initiatives. One of these is the Scholastic Reading Inventory (SRI), which enables students in grades 10-12 to earn college credit. The initial assessment takes place during two weeks. In addition, ninth-grade students completed the LinkIt! Benchmark testing for ELA on September 29. We are also implementing Data Teams in each school to improve student achievement by using data-driven decision-making.

LinkIt!, an academic measuring tool, has undergone significant improvements, making it more effective and easier to use for enhancing student outcomes. NJSLA Individual Student Reports have also been received, and they will be distributed to students and parents and stored in student files.

We continue to focus on professional development, including social studies engagement, Response to Intervention (RTI), and curriculum updates in ELA and Spanish. Our Summer Enrichment program was successful, offering new courses and promoting student learning and interaction.

We have introduced Classwize, a powerful Classroom Management Chromebook solution, and provided support for using Chalk. We have also standardized instruction across the district by selecting new US History I & II textbooks from McGraw Hill.

In World Language, we have developed universal rubrics and a placement plan for student advancement, with all resources updated and available in Chalk.

We commend Ms. Elkins-Solomon for her excellent webinar on using ReadTheory to teach writing skills. Our science and math curriculum teams have been complex at work,

creating resources and making updates to improve the learning experience for our students.

We hosted a successful New Staff Orientation and have been actively engaging with Accuplacer and placement data to support our students.

The implementation of Incident IQ will help streamline system help and error reporting. We are excited about the opportunities this platform offers.




Another guest artist this year, Spencer



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


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
